From researching obscure topics to discovering a citation buried deep within a text, Google Books is an amazing new tool that every researcher should be familiar with!</p>	<p>Title: Publishing, Permissions and Pictures: ARTstor images for academic publishing Presenter: Laurie Morrison Description: Seeking permission from copyright holders for images can be confusing, time consuming and costly. This session introduces you to ARTStor, a digital image database available to you through the Library, which can greatly reduce these hurdles. For instance, ARTstor provides 6,800 images from the Metropolitan Museum of Art with the legal framework required for limited use in academic publishing. Other issues surrounding image copyright and permissions will be explored.</p>
